The biblical stories in that time will lead us from Jesus' temptation in the desert to his glorious defeat over death.



Recently during my travels to Florida, I literally bumped-into a couple who had graduated nearly fifty years ago from Bethany College. Needless to say, this couple had similar feelings about the college, the church, and the community. They spoke affectionately of Charlotte and Bob Chambers and how they allowed for an "account" at the store, recalled many fond exchanges with the Gresham's, and couldn't stop celebrating the relationships they formed with fellow students and teachers.

But it was their recount of Bethany Memorial Church that most caught my attention. Our church became their family, offered unconditional love, and eventually threw a wedding for them! When friends and family did arrive for the ceremony, the college opened up dorm rooms for lodging, the



church ladies prepared a reception dinner, and John Cole baked their wedding cake!

Perhaps this narration doesn't sound too unusual except for one fact. The bride-to-be was pregnant. At that most vulnerable time, with huge decisions looming over them, when a young couple needed to feel accepted and loved, our church, our college, and our community stepped up to the occasion and offered that slow-melting-buttery-love... a feeling that still remains with them today.

That kind of love brings renewed meaning to the church mission of being "open and affirming" as we consider how far-reaching our church's affirmation and acceptance can go. In so many instances, and in so many directions, true acts of kindness and love will ooze through to the core, and never be forgotten. We need more love like that... lots of love.

In sermons, I'll also continue the focus on Disciples identity and heritage, including some of the more familiar stories from the Campbell/Scots-Irish stream of our history as well as stories from African American forebears and other communities who have always been an integral part of shaping Disciples life and culture. February 2 – Movement; February 9 – Wholeness; February 16 – Welcome; February 23 – Table.

In addition, during February we will observe our annual special emphasis on Week of Compassion, the relief and development ministry of Disciples. The offering will be collected on February 16 and 23. On February 23, we will hear from John Rodenberg about his recent trip to Myanmar with Week of Compassion Executive Director, the Rev. Vy Nguyen.

BMC "Adopts" Four!

Thanks to your generous
Outreach donations, BMC has
been able to adopt four people,
elders Mrs. Muniyammal
Ganesan and Mr. Topgay, and
children, four-year-old Moulika
D., and 18-month old Chinna
Appu. R. These individuals
were selected for us by our
Global Mission partners and
we support them through
Global Ministries.

Because Mrs. Ganesan was no longer able to work as a helper in a nursing home and because she has no living relatives to care for her, she became a resident of the Family Village Kasam-Katpadi, Farm in Vellore, India. Mr. Topgay fled Tibet in 1960, becoming a refugee at the Tibetan Refugee Self Help Centre in Darjeeling, India. Disabled due to a stroke, he and his wife live together in a house on the premises.

Moulika D. is studying English at the King's Matriculation School on the Family Village Farm. Her father works for day wages and her mother is a homemaker. Moulika has a two-year-old sister and is doing very well in school. Chinna Appu was found with his sister and two brothers roaming the streets, sleeping under a tree, and asking for food from villagers in the Vellore region of India. Members of a small ethnic group in the hills of Vellore, Chinna and one brother are being cared for at the Family Village Farm and the older children are elsewhere. As there are no birth records for the children, their ages are approximate.

We have sent funds to support all four people for the year. Here is what else we can do. You may write to any of our sponsored elders or children or send them gifts. If you wish to send additional monetary gifts, those through go sponsorship office. The church office has addresses for letters, gifts, and monetary contributions.
